The saying calls for "something blue," but I'm more interested in something green. When it comes to floral arrangements, how can I incorporate local flowers to be more sustainable?

Wildflowers, peonies, dahlias and zinnias are all in season during a Minnesota summer, making them a sustainable (and gorgeous) choice for your bouquet. If you're interested in sustainability, you aren't alone. Many Minnesota brides want to be earth-conscious on their wedding day, particularly when it comes to floral arrangements, says Jackie Reisenauer, co-owner of Munster Rose in Minneapolis. But while the Minnesota growing season is shorter than most (frost and snow galore), brides do have eco-friendly options.

"Embracing the seasons is a great way for brides to use locally grown flowers to be sustainable," says Reisenauer. For winter weddings in Minnesota, that means evergreens, spruce and juniper, all which are available locally. For the summer and fall months, peonies, dahlias and zinnias are in season.

While using locally grown flowers is important, Reisenauer also recommends asking your florist if they compost floral waste and collect rainwater, two other ways you can be as green as possible. *munsterrose.com*
